



Country: South Sudan

Highlights

• Latest IPC results officially released. On 22 October, the Government of South Sudan released the Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) report, covering the period of September 2015, with projections for the next six months. In September, 3.9 million people were classified as severely food insecure. This is a significant deterioration from the same period last year, in which 2.2 million people were severely food insecure.

This year's harvest has been affected by reduced agricultural activities due to conflict and prolonged dry spells at the start of the rains. Seasonal respite due to harvest yields is expected to be short-lived.

In numbers

1.66 million IDPs (OCHA estimates)

632,100 displaced outside South Sudan (UNHCR estimates)

176,600 seeking shelter with the UN (UNMISS estimates)

2.4 million projected to remain in emergency or crisis level food insecurity from October to December 2015 (IPC, September 2015)

Malnutrition remains above emergency thresholds in the conflict affected areas as well as the chronically high burdened states of Northern Bahr el Ghazal and Warrap. There are about 647,000 acutely malnourished children across the country.

Of the 3.9 million, 3.1 million people are classified at Crisis level and 800,000 people at Emergency level. For the first time, this IPC includes approximately 30,000 people in IPC Catastrophe level (included in the 800,000), namely populations in Mayendit, Leer, Koch and Guit counties in Unity state.

WFP Response

Food and Nutrition Assistance



- WFP and Cooperating Partners' Integrated Rapid Response Mechanism (IRRM) missions were completed in Dengjok, Gakdong, Kandak, Nyandit, Nyanapol (Jonglei), Mayendit, Abiemnhom (Unity), Maker, Tonga, Nyilwak, Pagak and Maiwuit (Upper Nile) this week.
- IRRM teams are currently deployed in Keew, Lankien, Mogok, Kurwai (Jonglei), Ganyiel (Unity), Wau Shilluck, and Ngueny/Nyatut (Upper Nile).
- Next missions are planned for Chuil, Jaibor, Nyambor, Haat, Pathai, Gorwai, Kaikuny, Ayueldit, Duk Poktap (Jonglei), Mankien, Dablual (Unity) Mathiang, Wajhtak and Oriny (Upper Nile).

Logistics 🛧 🔔 🚚

- The two barge convoys (voyage 009 transporting mostly Logistics Cluster cargo as well as 200 mt of WFP food and voyage 010 moving 1,400 mt of WFP food) have arrived in Malakal on 19 October. Offloading commenced on 22 Oct 2015 and it is anticipate to take a minimum of two weeks.
- Clearance for dispatching 1,007 mt of mixed commodities from Kosti, Sudan to Renk has been received.
- UNMISS has agreed to regularly provide Force Protection patrols along the Western corridor every seven to ten days. Several transporters contracted by WFP have been unable to complete their missions along the route due to fuel shortages and truck breakdowns. The first WFP convoy left on 17 October. The next convoy is planned for 25 October. UNMISS Force Protection will be provided from Juba/Mvolo to Rumbek.

Special Operations

Logistics Cluster



- The Logistics Cluster airlifted 143.6 mt on behalf of 15 partners to Akobo, Ganyiel, Jikmir, Keew, Kuernyang, Kurwai, Malakal, Malakal (FDP Wau Shilluk), Mayendit, Motot, Nyal, Nyilwak, Pagak, Paloich, Pibor, Rumbek and Ulang.
- The Logistics Cluster barge has arrived in Malakal carrying 400 mt of cargo for five partners: IOM, Sobat Community for Peace and Development, Solidarites International, UNICEF and World Vision International.
- The Logistics Cluster fleet currently consists of four Mi-8s (capacity of 2 mt each); one fixed-wing plane (5 mt); and one charter (6 mt). The helicopters have been tasked primarily to priority locations, as decided on by the Inter-Cluster Working Group, while the fixed-wing and charter have been supporting operations to Malakal (Wau Shilluk) and Paloich (Melut).

Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC)



- The ETC has identified the shift to renewable solar power in all its sites as the most suitable solution to supporting the humanitarian community responding in South Sudan.
- An ETC technician has successfully restored the full functionality of Internet services in Ganyiel, which has been unstable for a week, and is currently providing Helpdesk support for humanitarians responding in this area.
- The ETC has assessed the need for radio communication support in Ganyiel as well. A mission will be planned accordingly.

 The ETC continues to provide radio programming services to humanitarian partners in South Sudan. During the reporting period, 24 radios were programmed for FAO, IMC, Mines Advisory Group, UNMAS, UNDP and WFP.

UN Humanitarian Air Service



- UNHAS facilitated a Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) special mission to Malakal, with the delegation of OCHA's Director of its Coordination and Response Division, Mr. John Ging and a group of representatives from the humanitarian and donor communities. UNHAS also supported the cross-border flight launched by UNHAS Sudan from Khartoum to Juba to transport the delegation to South Sudan.
- During the week, a charter flight was performed from Bor to Akobo for UNICEF to support the reunification of 26 children with their families. In addition, UNHAS accommodated two children reunifying with their families on its regular flight from Malakal to Juba, also on behalf of UNICEF.
- Four cases of medical evacuations were accommodated on UNHAS regular flights out of Ajuong Thok, Motot and Yambio on behalf of African Humanitarian Action, Tearfund and UNHCR.
- UNHAS South Sudan has started in-flight services (offering water on board to passengers), in response to feedback from passengers in recent surveys.
- This week UNHAS transported 1,990 passengers and 13.6 mt of light cargo.
- UNHAS facilitated WFP and Cooperating Partners' Rapid Response Mobile team deployments in and out of Gorwai, Jiech, Keew, Kurwai, Mogok, Nyanapol, Nyilwak and Tonga.
