NATURE OF THE REVISION

- 1. This budget revision to Protracted Relief and Recovery Operation 200640 (PRRO) proposes to expand nutrition activities for an additional 33,369 beneficiaries through 31 December 2015. The revision addresses the anticipated nutritional needs of vulnerable populations for an expected food deficit in 2015.
- 2. Specifically, the revision:
 - > Provides an additional 2,447 mt of food valued at USD 2.2 million;
 - Increases external transport, landside transport, storage and handling, and other direct operational costs by USD 1.9 million; and
 - ➢ Increases direct support costs by USD 733,400.

JUSTIFICATION FOR THE REVISION

Summary of existing project activities

- 3. The PRRO was launched on 1 July 2014 to provide for the immediate food and nutrition needs of vulnerable households; protect livelihoods before, during and after shocks through safety nets; and build the long-term capacity of households, communities and national systems to enhance resilience to future shocks.
- 4. The operation assists 604,752 people over 30 months throughout the country with a combination of lifesaving, livelihood and nutrition activities. Nutrition activities include: (i) targeted supplementary feeding (TSF) to treat moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) in children aged 6–59 months and malnourished pregnant and lactating women (PLW) through community-based centres, and (ii) blanket supplementary feeding (BSF) to prevent peaks in acute malnutrition in areas with high prevalence of acute malnutrition and food insecurity.
- 5. TSF activities target children aged 6–59 months and malnourished PLW referred and admitted for treatment in accordance with the National Protocol for the Treatment of Acute Malnutrition. BSF is provided in targeted communities. Targeting considers areas where prevalence of food insecurity and acute malnutrition has been consistently high for the past five years.¹
- 6. During the past two years, Mauritania endured successive shocks that have seriously affected the food and nutrition security of the country and critically undermined the resilience capacity of the most vulnerable populations. The June 2014 Food Security Monitoring Survey and November 2014 Integrated Food Security Phase Classification show a deterioration in food security since June 2013. It is estimated that 1.2 million people (one-third of the population) will face food insecurity between January and March 2015, including 819,796 people living in moderate food insecurity whose borderline conditions would rapidly deteriorate into severe food insecurity if no external assistance is provided. The Governement and African Risk Capacity (ARC) will assist needy populations not covered by WFP.
- 7. In addition, it is anticipated that the poor rainy season will jeopardize the food and nutrition security of the most vulnerable populations, especially in the rainfed livelihood zone of the south, the Senegal River Valley and agro-pastoral zones. In the worst affected areas, lean season is anticipated to start as early as February instead of April 2015.
- 8. Given deteriorated food security and low rainfall, nutrition partners at the national level estimate 129,761 children aged 6–59 months with acute malnutrition are in urgent need of care.² This figure includes children with MAM in Assaba, Brakna, Gorgol, Guidimakha, Hodh-Chargui, Hodh el Gharbi, Tagant and Nouakchott where food insecurity and malnutrition rates

are among the highest. UNICEF, the only other nutrition partner supporting BSF in 2014 with WFP, scaled down this activity in December 2014.

Purpose of budget increase

- 9. This budget revision proposes to expand TSF and BSF activities with 88,590 additional beneficiaries for both activities through 31 December 2015. Specifically, the revision enables WFP to respond to significant increases in the number of children aged 6–59 months with MAM and undernourished PLW. This larger caseload aims to prevent the degradation of the nutritional situation in areas initially targeted by the PRRO.
- 10. The budget revision incorporates the high cost of community-based nutritional interventions. Additional funds are required to further support implementation of nutritional activities at the community level, including community-level screening and referral of undernourished children and mothers to appropriate nutrition centres.
- 11. Contextual, programmatic and institutional risk mitigation measures and monitoring and evaluation arrangements remain unchanged.
- 12. The project continues to 31 December 2016, but this budget revision extends through 31 December 2015 only. WFP will periodically reevaluate the food and nutrition situation and adjust PRRO strategy and beneficiary caseloads as may be required in response to evolving needs.
