



SENAC monthly E-letter - Strengthening Emergency Needs Assessment Capacity Update on progress to improve the quality and transparency of assessments

Welcome to the fifteenth issue of the SENAC e-letter!

The e-letter provides an update on progress made to enhance WFP's emergency needs assessment practice. This issue covers the months of November and December.

WHAT'S NEW?

1. Best practice

Comprehensive Food Security and Vulnerability Analysis (CFSVA) in Laos: The preliminary report was successfully launched in Vientiane in November. About 75 people representing the Government, UN partners, NGOs and donors participated in the event. The study revealed that despite the economic growth of the last ten years, every second child is chronically malnourished in rural Laos. Two thirds of the rural population are either food insecure or live on the edge of food security and could become food insecure should a shock occur during the year. Among them 13% are food insecure with either poor or borderline food consumption. This CFSVA is the first one to include a full analysis of risks and the likely impact of predictable shocks on household food security, thus providing a forward looking perspective on the situation. The Ministry of Health will use the results to develop its national nutrition policy. No food aid recommendation for Moldova: Further to an exceptional drought last summer, WFP and FAO conducted a Crop and Food Supply Assessment Mission (CFSAM) in September. The assessment team made 23 recommendations for short to long-term interventions. In particular it concluded that there was no need for international food aid but that some vulnerable groups would need to be assisted through existing governmental programmes. To refine the profile of the vulnerable groups, WFP is conducting, at the Government and UNDP's request, a Household Food Security Survey of rural areas (first one in the country). The survey is being conducted by a regional assessment officer and local staff members from Armenia and Georgia who recently participated in an Emergency Food Security Assessment training. 2. Food Security Analysis Service

Food Security Analysis Service at HQ and in the Regional Bureaux: The SENAC project will be winding down at the end of April 2008. Until then, it will continue to support efforts to mainstream technical guidance on the Comprehensive Food Security and Vulnerability Analysis (CFSVA), Emergency Food Security Assessments (EFSA) and provide training to ensure a consistent standardized approach to analysis. At HQ, the Emergency Needs Assessment (ODAN) and Vulnerability Analysis and Mapping (ODAV) Services will be merged into a single "Food Security Analysis Service" in the Programme Design and Support Division. The re-organized HQ Service will support greater integration of the assessment activities and products that WFP undertakes at various

stages of a crisis and project cycle, including CFSVA, food security monitoring systems (FSMS) and EFSAs. It will maintain strong capacities in the areas of methodology development, capacity building, spatial analysis and provide technical support to regional and country offices. *For more information, contact: john.aylieff@wfp.org, ODA Chief.*

3. Emergency Needs Assessments

Major assessments recently completed or ongoing:

Central and East Africa

O **Uganda:** Several initial assessments have taken place further to the floods that affected more than 300,000 people last September. The report of the WFP/FAO Crop and Food Supply Assessment Mission should be available soon. A follow up Emergency Food Security Assessment is now ongoing. *Contact: dipayan.bhattacharyya@wfp.org*

Sudan

O **Darfur:** Emergency Food Security and Nutrition Assessment (EFSNA) - (mid August - mid September): This yearly exercise has been conducted by WFP, UNICEF, FAO and the Sudanese government since 2004. *Contact:daniel.molla@wfp.org.*

West Africa

O **Burkina Faso:** Baseline nutrition survey (April) conducted with UNICEF and the Government. The results of the survey and the update conducted in September will be presented to the Government and partners on 17 December. Contact: *paola.dossantos@wfp.org*.

O **Cameroon:** UNHCR / WFP Joint Assessment Mission (11 -20 November) with the participation of UNICEF, MSF and the Government of Cameroon to re-assess the situation of refugees from the Central African Republic. Analysis is ongoing. *Contact: wilfred.nkwambi@wfp.org*

O **Central Africa Republic:** Follow-up Emergency Food Security Assessment, Nutrition and HIV/AIDS, including IDPs (20 September - 4 October). The report is being finalised. *Contact: mamadou.diouf@wfp.org*

O **Chad:** Self-sustenance capacity assessment of IDPs and refugees at the border with Sudan (20 October to 5 November) conducted in collaboration with OCHA, UNHCR, UNICEF, FAO, WHO. The report is being finalised. *Contact: ibrahima.diop@wfp.org*

O **Côte d'Ivoire**: Integrated Phase Classification (IPC). The report and IPC map are now available. A lessons learned workshop is scheduled for January. An FAO / WFP mission to assess the 2007 crop season is also planned in January to update the IPC. *Contact: moustapha.toure@wfp.org*

O **Ghana:** Emergency Food Needs Assessment (November): This assessment is a follow up to the initial assessments conducted by WFP and partners after the floods in September. It identifies the districts in the northern part of the country where food assistance may be needed and appropriate, and will help refine the numbers of those in danger of acute food insecurity for the period October 2007-April 2008. *Contact: Sibi.Lawson-Marriott@wfp.org*

O Guinea Bissau: Ongoing assessment activities focus on food security monitoring. The data collected in the rural districts in November shows that household stocks are low. Food insecurity will hinge on the performance of the cashew marketing season in 2008. Cashew nuts are a lean-season crop that some 60 to 70 percent of rural Bissau-Guineans rely on to acquire rice. The CO will produce 'food security profiles' - using the four FSM surveys undertaken since 2006 - to illustrate the seasonal and geographical variations of rural food security with a view to improving program design and targeting. *Contact: jean-martin.bauer@wfp.org*

Asia

O Bangladesh:

Rapid UN assessment following cyclone Sidr (18-20 November). It was estimated that 2.6 million people are in need of immediate relief assistance.

Emergency Food Security and Nutrition Assessment (2-22 December): It will assess the impact of the cyclone on household food security, nutrition and livelihoods, and will include a survey of markets. It will complement other ongoing assessments, such as FAO's livelihoods assessment, and the nutrition and health survey being undertaken by Helen Keller International and UNICEF. Based on the results, WFP's emergency assistance will be refined, with a second phase of response directed at early recovery / livelihood support and disaster risk reduction. *Contact: simeon.hollema@wfp.org*

Latin America

O **Mexico:** At the request of UNDP and authorities from the States of Tabasco and Chiapas, WFP presented its emergency food security assessment methodology at a workshop on 12-13 December, with a view to provide technical assistance to assess the impact of the intense floods and landslides that occurred in both states at the end of October and in early November. In both states, quite a lot of information on the impact of the disaster is already available, and WFP will work with UNDP, FAO, other agencies and local authorities to provide technical support on analysing this information in an integrated manner, and to identify gaps in information that would be filled by a tailored EFSA in January or February 2008. In Tabasco, WFP and UNDP will also assist with the preparation of reference documents to improve preparedness for EFSAs and contingency planning in the event of future disasters. *Contact: agnes.dhur@wfp.org or margarita.lovon@wfp.org*

O **Togo:** WFP and FAO are planning a crop assessment in January in the areas affected by the floods last September. 4. Pre-crisis Information

Comprehensive Food Security and Vulnerability Analysis (CFSVA) recently completed or ongoing:

• **Burkina Faso:** A technical committee consisting of Government, FEWSNET, UNICEF, WHO and WFP has been established to design and implement the survey planned for February and March 2008. • Cameroon (May 2007): The report is being finalised. Key findings and preliminary recommendations have been discussed. The presentation of the results will take in January. *Contact: wilfred.nkwambi@wfp.org*

<u>Gates Foundation support to CFSVAs</u>: The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is providing a grant of USD7.79 million over a period of 6 years to support comprehensive food security and vulnerability analysis (CFSVA) in 16 sub-Saharan African countries. The countries selected by the Gates Foundation include 7 in West Africa: Benin, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Ghana, Mali, Nigeria and Senegal; and 9 in Southern, Central and East Africa: Angola, Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Rwanda, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia. Update on Food Security Monitoring Systems funded by SENAC:

• **Burkina Faso:** For the moment, field missions provide monitoring information. After the CFSVA is conducted in 2008, a more systematic FSMS will be set up. *Contact: paola.dossantos@wfp.org*

• **Rwanda:** Second round of data is ongoing in the six chronically affected districts with supervision from National Institute of Statistics. • **Uganda:** The first round of data collection and analysis has been completed. The data was used to provide initial information to estimate the impact of the floods on household food security. 5. Methods and Tools

<u>Revision of the Emergency Food Security Assessment (EFSA) Handbook:</u> The revised version, due to be issued in the first quarter of 2008, will bring together the methodological advances made over the past two years and assessor's experience from field work. The status is as follows:

> Part I "Objectives of an EFSA and analytical framework" and Part II "Overview of the analytical process and types of EFSA" have been finalized.

Part V "Situation Analysis" and Part VI "Analysing EFSA data and forecasting and response analysis" are being adjusted taking into account the information now included in Parts III and IV.

> Part III "Data, Indicators and Sources of Information" and Part IV "Designing and Conducting an EFSA" are being finalized.

> Part VII "*Reporting EFSA Results*" is being prepared. Contact agnes.dhur@wfp.org, Senior Methodology Specialist.

Initial Rapid Assessment tool / IASC Nutrition Cluster: The IASC Nutrition Cluster meeting took place in Geneva from 13 to 15 November. Among other issues, the Cluster discussed the development of a comprehensive capacity building package for agencies and staff, the field testing of the Initial Rapid Assessment (IRA) data collection tool to be used in the first few days after a crisis to assess the nutritional and food security situation, and the preparation of a Comprehensive Assessment Tool for the subsequent phase. The IRA tool should be finalized by the end of the year, based on lessons learnt from a few field pilots. A first draft of the Comprehensive Assessment Tool should also be circulated to the Nutrition Cluster members in December. *Contact: andrew.thornelyman@wfp.org* or *agnes.dhur@wfp.org*

Assessing Government Response Capacities in Food Security Crises: With the support of the Danish Government, the Emergency Needs Assessment Service (ODAN) is developing practical guidance to assess government response capacities to respond to food security crisis. The following draft tools have so far been developed: i) an assessment matrix with a set of key indicators at different levels (macro economic, institutional & organizational and programming); ii) a guidance note and iii) an indicator catalogue. They are currently being field tested in Bolivia, Yemen and Tajikistan. ODAN is soliciting feedback from a wider pool of Country Offices regarding the application of the draft assessment matrix. A round-up consultation workshop will be held in February to discuss the tools and lessons learned from the field testing experience. *Contact: angie.lee@wfp.org, Programme Officer.*

<u>Consultation with National Governments on Emergency Needs Assessments</u> (19-21 November) Rome: Government representatives from 11 countries and two regional organisations participated in a consultation, with the objectives of: familiarizing partners with the technical progress made in emergency needs assessment methods and tools; and fostering collaboration to develop procedures and capacities to undertake emergency needs assessments. Integrated Food Security and Humanitarian Phase Classification (IPC): The IPC Steering Committee (FAO, WFP, FEW NET, Oxfam, CARE, SCF UK and US and the EC's Joint Research Center) will meet on 18-19 December in Washington to discuss the work programme for 2008, the status of the five-year multi-agency proposal submitted to the EC, and endorse a technical addendum to the IPC manual (to be finalised at a technical workshop on 10-11 December). In the meantime, the IPC is being piloted and implemented in the following way:

WFP-led pilots: In addition to the pilots already completed in Sri Lanka, Camdodia and Indonesia, an IPC pilot will be finalized in Tajikistan in December. In Nepal, the standard classification is being integrated into the current food security monitoring system. In Côte d'Ivoire, FAO and WFP have completed a first cycle of IPC analysis (report and map available - see above in section 2); a second cycle and a lessons learned workshop will take place in January 2008.

FAO-led activities: In Somalia, Kenya and Burundi, the IPC is an established instrument and used on a regular basis. In DRC, Sudan, Uganda and Niger, IPC consultations and awareness-raising sessions are taking place.

Progress made on mainstreaming HIV/AIDS into CFSVAs: The HIV/AIDS and ODAV units in HQ and in the Southern Africa Regional Bureau are working together to include an HIV and AIDS component in the Comprehensive Food Security and Vulnerability Analyses to better understand the links between HIV, AIDS and household food security. Technical guidelines will be disseminated in early 2008. WFP presented the guidelines to the SADC VAC Annual Organizational Meeting in Johannesburg, (4th-5th December) with a strong emphasis on lessons learned on data collection and analyses, and how findings related to HIV/AIDS and food insecurity can informed the design and targeting of food assistance programmes. These lessons will inform the VAC activities in Angola, where a specific study on HIV/AIDS impact on crop production will be conducted in 2008. In Lesotho, Swaziland, Zambia, Zimbabwe, the National Vulnerability Assessment Committees plan to further address HIV/AIDS issues in their activities in 2008. *Contact: chiara.brunelli@wfp.org*

6. Market Analysis

<u>Market Analysis</u>: Market analysis is now directly integrated into needs assessments, VAM baseline studies and FSMS. Other ongoing stand-alone market studies include:

O **Syria**: A market assessment (5 to 13 October) looked at the feasibility of a cash/voucher programme for providing assistance to Iraqi refugees in Syria, and analysed the functioning of markets with regards to sufficient and affordable food supplies for the refugee population. *Contact: thomas.beuter@wfp.org*

O **Honduras, Guatemala, Nicaragua and El Salvador:** The purpose is to obtain more systematized and better information on staple food prices in the region, on their seasonal variations and on the anomalies that are currently affecting markets, and the link to household food security. O **Uganda**: A Country Situation Analysis is currently ongoing to provide information on food supply, demand, and trade, with an emphasis on small holders. This analysis will help the Country Office to develop a proposal for the WFP/Gates Foundation "Purchase for Progress Initiative" whose objective is to leverage WFP local procurement to promote smallholder farmers' market access and agriculture production. *Contact: simon.dradri@wfp.org*. O **Djibouti**: a basic market price monitoring and analysis system for Djibouti has been developed in collaboration with FEWSNET. *Contact: Sharon.osterloh@wfp.org or scott.ronchini@wfp.org*

Monitoring food prices in West Africa:

O **Mauritania:** HQ's Economics Analysis Unit is developing a tool to estimate the number of households affected by the recent food price increase. *Contact: issa.sanogo@wfp.org*

O **Guinea Bissau:** The weekly monitoring of markets shows a 40 percent increase in the price of rice since last October. Should the trend persist into 2008 it may affect rural food security. The CO has developed tools to adequately model household food availability. *Contact: jean-martin.bauer@wfp.org*

<u>Workshop on partnerships in market analysis for food security</u> (11-13 December), Johannesburg: This workshop organized jointly by ODAN (Needs Assessments) and PDPE (Economic Analysis Unit) brought together professionals from WFP and key partners (FAO, World Bank, FEWS NET, NGOs and academic institutions) to share best practices on market analysis in support of food security programming. Since 2006, WFP has made specific efforts to integrate market analysis into its needs assessments, food security baselines and monitoring systems, and has developed tools to better understand how markets influence food insecurity

(available at <u>http://home.wfp.org/organisation/divisions/pd/pdp/</u>). Participants discussed lessons learned on the use of the tools, how market analysis has influenced decisions on programs, and the capacity needed to conduct market analysis. 7. Capacity Building

Capacity Building Strategy for the WFP East and Central Africa Region (ODK): The Regional Bureau is engaged in a long-term initiative to strengthen country and sub office capacity in assessment, analysis, and preparedness. After completing a series of field-based trainings for staff and partners in Somalia, Ethiopia, and Kenya, a second round of training is nearing completion in Burundi, Tanzania, Uganda, and Djibouti. To culminate the 2007 process, a regional Training of Trainers was convened in early December for Country/Sub Office resource people to enhance facilitation skills and update country specific 2008 plans. By the end of 2007, ODK will have facilitated a total of 15 learning events on strengthened food security assessment for over 250 participants. In Uganda, Ethiopia and Djibouti, a market module was introduced in the training to provide an understanding of the link between markets and household food security, as well as the implications of market functioning for WFP response options. *Contact: patrick.foley@wfp.org, Capacity Building Coordinator or scott.ronchini@wfp.org, Regional VAM Adviser.*

<u>Capacity Building Strategy for the WFP South African Region (ODJ)</u>: ODJ is defining its strategy for strengthening assessment and analysis capacity for 2008. Training in household survey methods (design and statistical analysis) and integrating market analysis are the priorities. The strategy will be embedded into the Regional / National Vulnerability Assessment Committee (R/NVAC) system and its recently established capacity building initiative - the Center(s) of Excellence (CofE). This will help to address immediate capacity building needs, and build sustainable capacity within and beyond WFP. It will also contribute to the institutional legitimacy of the CofE and RVAC system, while benefiting from the expertise of local academic institutions. *Contact: sylvie.montembault@wfp.org*
