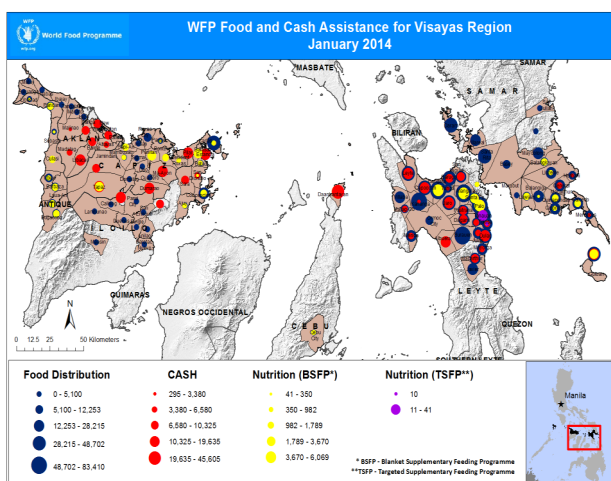

### Philippines: Super Typhoon Haiyan

## Highlights

- Since the start of the operation, WFP has reached 2,9 million unique beneficiaries. This figure includes those who have received different types of WFP assistance, i.e. general food distribution nutrition and cash over the last three months.
- WFP is currently finalizing its plans for early recovery and livelihood support activities in the Typhoon Haiyan-affected areas. The focus is to assist vulnerable population groups in rehabilitating communal assets, with a view at increasing resilience for future emergencies, through conditional cash interventions- Food for Assets/ Cash for Assets (FFA /CFA).

## WFP Response



### Food Assistance

- WFP is continuing general food distributions, although increasingly fine-tuning its targeting to prioritize geographical areas where food gaps are more pronounced.
- At the close of the January distribution cycle, WFP had reached 92 percent of its planned figure for general food distribution; 89 percent of planned cash beneficiaries; and 45 percent of its planned nutrition (BSFP) caseload. The relatively modest achievement rate for nutrition is attributed to delays in the arrival of key nutrition commodities due to the heavy rains and problems with transportation resulting from the onset of Tropical Depression "Agaton". As a result, distributions have been carried over into February.



### Nutrition

- WFP is transitioning to phase two of its nutrition intervention plan, through Targeted Supplementary Feeding (TSFP) and micro-nutrient powders (MNP). Commodities for the second phase are already in WFP warehouses and the nutrition team continue to engage with partners to discuss distribution practices, monitoring and reporting requirements.



### Cash

- To date WFP has disbursed over US\$ 4.4 million, through its NGO- World Vision International and Action Against Hunger (ACF)- partners and Philippine Government's Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) platform.
- As markets progressively recover in those municipalities worse affected by the typhoon, cash activities are being expanded, while food distribution is phased out. The shift in assistance allows vulnerable communities to buy fresh produce, while providing a stimulus to local markets and communities towards their rehabilitation.

## Logistics

- To date and since the start of the operation, WFP has dispatched a total of 29,048 mt of food, including 28,468 mt of rice, 105 mt of specialized nutrition products and 474 mt of High-Energy Biscuits (HEBs).

## UNHAS

- With commercial passenger services now operational in much of the typhoon-affected areas, UNHAS regular services in the Philippines will cease as of 15 February.
- Since the start of the operation, UNHAS has transported over 3,000 passengers, facilitated 15 medical evacuations and moved over 11 mt of humanitarian cargo to 20 different locations, in the service of 82 humanitarian partners.

## Clusters

### Food Security and Agriculture Cluster

- The Cluster is coordinating Partner recovery and livelihood activities as they transition from the emergency phase. Focus is being placed on FFA /CFA interventions, together with the rehabilitation of fishing /costal resources, small scale coconut, corn and rice farmers as well as backyard livestock keepers.

### Logistics Cluster

- Since the beginning of the operation, WFP has dispatched over 37,500 m3 /22,572 mt of humanitarian cargo on behalf of 39 different organizations.
- The Logistics Cluster provides transport services to partners on an ad-hoc basis, where there are gaps in capacities or access constraints by co-sharing WFP resources.
- The Logistics Cluster continues to provide temporary storage in Cebu, Roxas, Tacloban, Guiuan and Ormoc.

## Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC)

- Local internet services providers are gradually recovering from the typhoon and restoring connectivity. As these services come back online, humanitarian users will be switched from ETC networks to commercial providers.

## Partnerships

- WFP is partnering with the provincial health offices (PHOs) of Cebu and Antique for the implementation of the targeted supplementary feeding programme (TSFP). Partnership with PHO Capiz for TSFP is planned but still under discussion.

## Resourcing Update

- WFP has received contributions from the following Governments to date: Australia, Austria, Azerbaijan, Canada, Denmark, Estonia, European Commission, Finland, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Kuwait, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Republic of Korea, the Russian Federation, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom and United States and the UN CERF Fund. Additionally, millions of dollars have been received from generous private donations.
