Nepal — Road to Recovery

For the tiny Himalayan nation of Nepal, the last two months have been punctuated by earthquakes and aftershocks resulting in large-scale humanitarian response efforts. Just 48 hours after the first earthquake rocked Nepal on 25 April, a team from WFP FITTEST was on the ground and is still in the country today.

Almost two months on and operating out of a pre-fab next to the Cargo Hall in Kathmandu's Tribhuvan International Airport as well as out in the field, FITTEST continues to support the provision of vital internet connectivity and security telecommunications services in 14 locations.

It is also concentrating on building local capacity to ensure the sustainability of all services and solutions.

LESS is more in Africa

As most of you may know. **FITTEST** has been busy developing, manufacturing and distributing Logistics Execution Support Solution (LESS) mobile connectivity kits that provide and electrical power data connectivity so that the LESS application can be used in remote warehouse locations where power and/or data connectivity is not available.

Intended to support the roll-out of the LESS project, the LESS

kits are currently positioned for use in Sudan, South Sudan, Ethiopia and Djibouti. FITTEST Training Services is providing much-needed ICT and end-user training for WFP personnel in these four locations and has also conducted a LESS kit 'Train the Trainer' module in Dubai.

The LESS project will help WFP be more effective, cost-efficient and accountable throughout the supply chain, ensuring that the right food gets to the right people at the right time. FITTEST is expecting to continue to support the LESS project throughout 2015.
