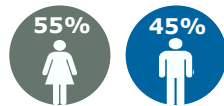

Highlights

- As part of efforts to further mainstream protection and accountability to affected populations into programmes, WFP held a three day workshop covering issues related to gender based violence and prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse.
- WFP and World Vision kick started the first training session for over 1,700 participants as part of support to food insecure households in Juba.

Highlights

- WFP and partners including the Food Security and Livelihoods Cluster (FSLC) are engaged in the national level Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) analysis. The IPC analysis will give projections for 2017 levels of food insecurity which are expected to be higher than previously seen in South Sudan.
- WFP continues to strengthen its protection and Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP) efforts in its programmes in South Sudan. A workshop was held for WFP staff from 25-27 January to develop capacities to mainstream protection, gender and AAP, including ways to address gender based violence (GBV) and prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA). The workshop focused on strategic pathways towards engaging in humanitarian protection for 2017, assuring civilians' safety, rights and dignity, alongside providing material assistance and accountability that is central to staffs' roles and responsibilities.

WFP Response



Food and Nutrition Assistance

- On 23 January, WFP and World Vision kick started the training sessions as part of the Juba urban poor response pilot through which 7,000 food insecure households will receive cash based transfers and skills training. The first training group included over 1,700 people who participated in nutrition skills building sessions over the week. In the coming weeks, training will be rolled out to the remaining participants along with cash payments to all households.
- Following recent displacement from areas around Yambio, WFP distributed household rations for approximately 7,700 people who are seeking shelter in Yambio and the communities of Riimenze and Cassia



(Western Equatoria). The distribution comes following a verification exercise conducted by WFP, World Vision, and the Relief and Rehabilitation Commission (RRC).

- Integrated Rapid Response Mechanism (IRRM) teams are ongoing in 11 deep field locations in the Greater Upper Nile region to provide food and nutrition assistance to 273,000 people. Over the coming weeks, IRRM teams plan to deploy to 15 locations to provide life-saving assistance to 400,000 people.



Supply Chain

- In January so far, WFP has delivered 5,275mt of food commodities in South Sudan, accounting for 274 rotations from seven locations where aircraft are based.

Clusters and Common Services



Food Security & Livelihoods Cluster (FSLC)

- The FSLC and WFP's nutrition team met with the global Nutrition Cluster and country level nutrition partners to prepare for an inter-cluster mission in South Sudan which is being planned by the respective HQs. The purpose of the mission is to review the current plan for joint nutrition programming and establish an action plan for Northern Bahr el Ghazal, specifically.



Logistics Cluster

- Over the last week, the Logistics Cluster coordinated the delivery of 100mt of humanitarian relief items to Ganyiel, Kodok, Loth, Malakal, Nyal, Udier, Waat, Walgak and Yambio on behalf of 10 organizations.
- The Logistics Cluster supported a rapid response mission to Udier by transporting over 2mt of Health and Nutrition and items for UNICEF.
- Working closely with WFP, this year the Logistics Cluster has successfully coordinated convoys to Eastern Equatoria, Lakes, Northern Bahr el Ghazal, Western Bahr el Ghazal and Unity states. On 26 January, the Logistics Cluster coordinated its second humanitarian convoy along the western corridor through Rumbek and Wau to Bentiu.

UN Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS)

- Over the last week UNHAS transported 1,770 passengers and 18mt of light humanitarian cargo. One security relocation and four medical evacuations were facilitated on scheduled flights

from Malakal, Ajuong Thok, Kandak and Agok for four agencies.

- UNHAS also provided support for 46 WFP airdrop flights, delivering 1,329mt of food commodities. UNHAS also facilitated two IRRM missions to Haat and Lankien involving Catholic Relief Services and Oxfam.
- During this week, UNHAS performed two charter flights for UNHCR facilitating the movement of 33 refugees from Yei to Ajuong Thok.
- UNHAS supported an OCHA organized Inter Agency Mission to Loth, Leer county (Unity) with participation by four partners.
- UNHAS continues to support the child reunification efforts of UNICEF. During the reporting period, two children were reunited with their families in Juba, from Malakal.
- On 23 January, UNHAS flights were cancelled to four destinations, Malakal, Ulang, Mayom and Pagak which affected over 150 humanitarian passengers. Recovery flights operated to facilitate some passengers, however operations to Malakal will be supported when the security situation permits.



Feeder Roads

- Construction work on the remaining road segments is ongoing and progressing well. All ongoing feeder road construction projects are expected to be completed by March 2017.
